

Your vestry is a key component of the operations and ministry of lona-Hope according to the Canons of The Episcopal Church.

They are the legal representatives of the parish with the primary functions of overseeing the property (which is held in trust for the Diocese), seeing to the financial state including oversight of the budget and generating funds, and the call and care of the Rector. This is a tall order and requires regular communication and meetings to ensure the accomplishment of these tasks.

Members are elected to the vestry each year to serve a three-year term. At our annual meeting in January we will need to elect four people, who are members of Iona-Hope and have pledged in 2024.

Please consider if you bring the skills, commitment and willingness to stand for election and serve on the vestry. If so, please talk with any vestry member and/or Mother Jenny. Our monthly meetings are on the third Tuesday of the month at 3:30 pm. Additionally, we will have at least one vestry retreat each year.





ACS REALM

<u>What is Realm</u>? Realm is an online ministry tool. It helps our church connect with you and you connect with us. Realm allows you to manage your personal information and who is allowed to see it, control your giving, access your giving statements and add/change your pledge. It can be accessed by computer, tablet or smartphone.

<u>What about my privacy</u>? Realm is safe, private, and secure. Your privacy is one of our greatest concerns. Realm is only made up of the people in your church, it's not like a social network that's open to everyone. Realm keeps your data safe and gives you control over what information you share and who can see it.

<u>What about giving</u>? Realm gives you control over your giving. Giving should be easy, and Realm places giving right in the palm of your hands. You may set up recurring gifts, view your giving history, and make changes at any time. Realm automatically

records all electronic gifts and adds them to your giving record making it easy for you to give, and easy for our bookkeeper to track.

LAY EUCHARISTIC VISITORS

& LAY EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates them in everyone. To

each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. – 1 Corinthians 12:4-7

God calls all faithful people into ministry and community with one another as the Body of Christ. God also equips all people for these ministries – with that famous variety of gifts, so that we have poets and activists, teachers and engineers, parents and bankers.

Licensed lay ministries are one way that the Episcopal Church lives into the dream of God, where all the saints are called and equipped for ministry, service and love. Those with gifts for compassion might be called to take part in a visiting ministry. Someone with gifts of speaking and teaching may want to explore becoming a lay preacher. Listed here are the specifically licensed ministries named in our canons that lay people might engage in the life of a congregation:

Eucharistic Minister

A Eucharistic Minister is a lay person authorized to administer the Consecrated Elements at a Celebration of Holy Eucharist. A Eucharistic Minister should normally act under the direction of a Deacon, if any, or otherwise, the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith.

Eucharistic Visitor

A Eucharistic Visitor is a lay person authorized to take the Consecrated Elements in a timely manner following a Celebration of Holy Eucharist to members of the congregation who, by reason of illness or infirmity, were unable to be present at the Celebration. A Eucharistic Visitor should normally act under the direction of a Deacon, if any, or otherwise, the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith.






IONA-HOPE'S SCHEDULED SHOWS FOR BPDT 2025

Iona-Hope Episcopal Church - what does that mean?

Advent -

What does the Advent wreath mean? And why are the candles blue and pink?

The last weekend of November we begin the season of Advent, waiting for God to work His miracles in our hearts, and we change the color to **BLUE**, we can also use the color **PURPLE** since both colors represent seasons of repentance, preparation and contemplation.

Advent: Advent is the first season of the year because it begins the story of the events of Christ's life, death, and resurrection. Advent refers to the approach or arrival of someone or something and is the season in which we anticipate God's birth into our world. Advent is a time to examine ourselves and our lives and do an inner housecleaning as we make ourselves ready to receive the wonder of Jesus. It is a quiet, contemplative time as we await the majesty of God. Beginning in late November or early December, Advent contains the four Sundays before Christmas Day.

The **Advent wreath**, is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of **Advent** in the liturgical Calendar of the Western Church. It is usually a horizontal Evergreen Wreath with four candles and often, a fifth, white candle in the center. Beginning with the First Sunday of Advent, the lighting of a candle can be accompanied by a Bible reading, devotional time and prayers. An additional candle is lit during each subsequent week until, by the last Sunday before Christmas, all four candles are lit. Many Advent wreaths include a fifth, Christ candle which is lit at Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. The custom is observed both in family settings and at public church services.

The most popular colors for the Advent candles are violet and rose, corresponding with the colors of the liturgical vestments for the Sundays of Advent. In the Western Church Violet is the historic liturgical color for three of the four Sundays of Advent: Violet is the traditional color of penitential seasons. Rose is the color for the Third Sunday of Advent, known as Gaudete Sunday from the Latin word meaning "to rejoice". In some Protestant churches, the candles represent hope, peace, love and joy. Often the third candle, representing love, is a different color than the other three, representing the importance of love as the greatest of all the qualities that abide eternally.

A personal note, When I asked a Professor at Seminary the true definition of the pink candle, his response

was - "Well pink Candle Sunday, is just not as purple as the other Sundays in Advent". This often means we can be less penitential on this Sunday, similar to one Sunday during Lent that is also represented by Pink, and is often called Refreshment Sunday, taking a break from the penitential season.

Christmas can be a painful time for some. It may be the first Christmas without a loved family member who has recently died; it may be a time that has always been difficult.

The constant refrain on the radio and television, in shopping malls and churches, about the happiness of the season, about getting together with family and friends, reminds many people of what they have lost or have never had. The anguish of broken relationships, the insecurity of unemployment, the weariness of ill health, the pain of isolation - all these can make us feel very alone in the midst of the celebrating and spending. We need the space and time to acknowledge our sadness and concern; we need to know that we are not alone.

For these reasons, Iona Hope Episcopal will offer a special "Longest Night" or "Blue Christmas" service on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>December 19th at 6:00pm</u>. This gathering provides a space for those who are having a difficult time during the holidays or simply need to acknowledge some pain or loss they are carrying in the midst of this season of celebration.

So come and join with us in sharing and hearing prayers, scripture, and music that acknowledge that God's presence surrounds those who mourn, for those who struggle - and that God's Word comes to shine light into our darkness. Everyone is welcome, bring a friend, neighbor or family member.

What Service do you go to?

SAFEGUARDING

We are looking at doing another Safeguarding All God's Children training in early 2025.

Per Diocesan guidelines we have to redo this every five years. We are asking who would be interested in doing this training and whether we should do a group training in the Adler Gathering Place or we do it individually from our home computers. Please note, for certain positions held at the church, this training is a requirement.

"Safeguarding" is a program that aims to prevent various types of abuse by educating our leaders of the parish.

Participants learn about:


- Warning signs of abuse
- How to prevent abuse
- How to report suspected abuse
- ♦ How to respond to allegations of abuse
- The methods offenders use to commit abuse
- Policies and procedures for reporting abuse, screening volunteers and employees, and victim advocacy

I Want To Be A Member of Iona-Hope

One of the great joys of ministry at Iona-Hope is when you approach us and say that you want to become a member. Membership in The Episcopal Church can seem a bit complicated, but we assure you that there is a place for you as a member.

Types of Membership

Prospect: This means that you have not indicated a desire to be a member. If you have completed a yellow card and/or made a financial contribution, you will be listed as a prospect and be placed in our parish directory.

<u>Baptized Member</u>: If you were baptized in another church or denomination that baptizes in the name of the Trinity, you can register with Iona-Hope as a baptized member. This membership indicates that you want this to be your spiritual home. It is hoped (not required) that all adult baptized members will be confirmed.

<u>Confirmed Communicant:</u> If you were confirmed by a bishop in The Episcopal Church you can transfer your membership to Iona-Hope as a confirmed communicant. Additionally, if you were confirmed by a bishop in the Roman Catholic or Evangelical Lutheran Churches, you can be received as a confirmed communicant by a bishop in The Episcopal Church. Confirmed communicants are full members who have made a "mature commitment to Christ" with laying on of hands by the bishop. You have voting privileges and can stand for election to the vestry.

Sojourner: This is a special category for Iona-Hope and includes people who want to maintain their membership at another congregation but make Iona-Hope their spiritual home while in Fort Myers. You may be a prospect or member, according to the categories above.

COLUMBARIUM INFORMATION

What is a columbarium?

A columbarium is a structure that is comprised of a group of compartments (known as "niches") designed to repose cremation urns. Each niche can accommodate two urns.

The columbarium is retained within a wall (known as a housing structure) that is constructed of building materials complementary to the existing architecture of the church, allowing the project to look as if it is an intended part of the physical plant.


What are the benefits of a church columbarium?

Creating a columbarium ministry at Iona-Hope will allow us to fulfill the centuries-old obligation of serving from baptism to death. As the rite of baptism welcomed members into the church community, the centuries-old rite of Christian burial offered congregants a final homecoming and provided comfort to the living, with the knowledge their loved ones were near their spiritual gathering place. A columbarium will revive this churchyard tradition.

- It is a visible sign that the church cares for its members.
- It provides comfort to the family having a memorial to their deceased loved ones at the church.
- It provides a more favorable option as compared to other methods it is economical, theologically sound and environmentally friendly.
- Offers a convenient way to handle pre-need concerns, relieving the surviving family of difficult decisions.

In addition to meeting these needs a columbarium ministry will strengthen ties between church and family. Family members are more likely to maintain their connection to the church, as visitations are now made easier. No longer will they have to pack up the station wagon and drive to a secular, often distant cemetery to visit a loved one's final resting place. The family can visit and reflect before or after service.

This ministry unites the church, both past and present. Those who have come before us are once again part of the church and the entire community of faith can join in celebrating Christmas service, Easter sunrise service, weekly Sabbath services as well as weddings and other significant events.

Nurture Body, Mind and Spirit This Christmas Season

As we enter this holiday season there are many opportunities to nurture ourselves amid the hustle and bustle.

With December we gratefully welcome returning sojourners and, unfortunately, the advent of flu season as well. There are many tools at hand to help you protect yourself from the unwanted bug.

- If you have not already done so, get your flu shot. The vaccine takes about two weeks to become fully effective, so the sooner the better. Local pharmacies, physician offices and the Lee County Health Department all offer vaccination; Medicare and most medical insurance will cover the cost.
- Keep your immune system healthy: eat a balanced diet, get some exercise and adequate sleep.
- Reduce your exposure: wash your hands frequently with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer, use the sanitizing wipes offered for shopping carts, keep your distance from those who are ill and avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.
- At church: consider sharing the peace verbally or with a smile or sign rather than a hand shake or hug. Consider communing by intinction (dipping the wafer into the wine) rather than sharing the common cup. Although God's Grace in the sacrament is not at all diminished by dipping rather than sipping, your exposure to an unwanted bug might be.
- ♦ If you feel under the weather: stay home and rest, minimize your exposure to others.

We know that this busy season can be a stressful one and that unmanaged stress can weaken our immune systems and increase our susceptibility to illness.

- Maintain a familiar routine as much as you are able including your healthy diet, exercise and sleep routines.
- ♦ Remember that you do not need to be all things to all people: learn to say 'no'.
- ♦ A little extra organizing and planning goes a long way to maintaining order and preventing a last-minute rush.
- Nothing has to be perfect: focusing your energy on the people in your life rather than minute details will make your days more enjoyable.
- Set aside some quiet time for yourself.

Not all our spirits sing during the holidays. Those who are alone and those grieving a loss may find this time especially isolating and difficult. Some thoughts for those who have suffered loss:

- Be gentle with yourself. Trust that grieving is the process by which we heal. The holiday season holds many potential emotional triggers. Know that a wide range of emotions are both possible and likely at any given moment and without warning. Do your best to roll with it. Feel no guilt for allowing yourself laughter or tears. Leaning into these moments and allowing space for grieving draws us through the painful times. There is no right or wrong.
- Set healthy boundaries. If it feels like a good thing to join in an event or invitation, great. If not, it's okay to say no.
